1948

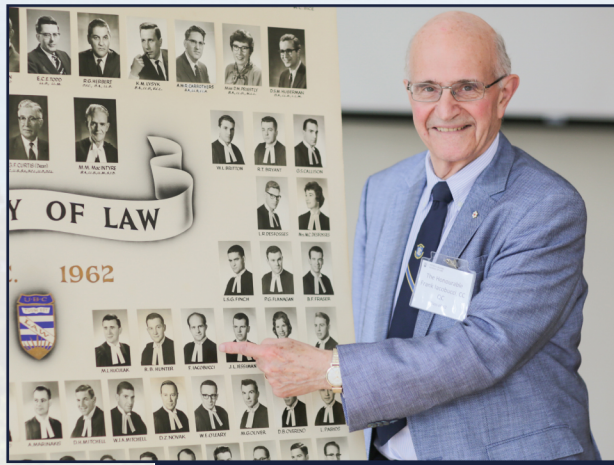
The first graduating class - affectionately referred to as "The Old Sweats".

The UBC Law Review is established.



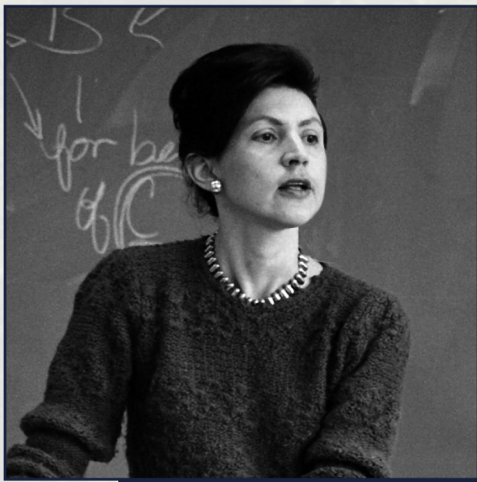
1962

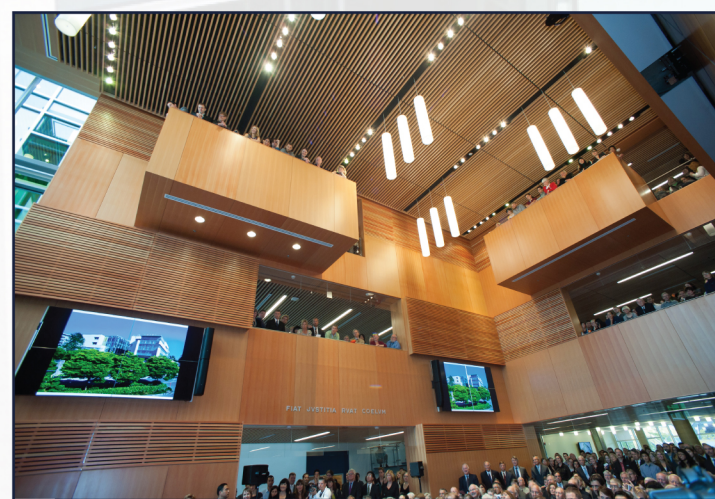
1997
